When Is Crochet Art?

The easy answer is, whenever the crocheter thinks it is, whenever they feel that they have been inspired to creative an item that is "art-worthy." However, we can get a lot more specific. One type of popular crochet art is yarn bombing.

In June, the Crochet Texas! guest speaker was London Kaye. She is a crochet artist and yarn bomber extraordinaire. London started yarn bombing when she lived in New York City, creating whimsical pieces of art, mainly in her neighborhood. This led to her being asked to crochet much larger projects, such as

wrapping a bus. London has crocheted art for Disney, Carvana, Hallmark, Starbucks, and more. She also crochets for Love Across the USA, a public art project led by London Kaye. They create large, powerful crochet art installations that amplify the voices and visions of women from the past and present that are changing the world.

Yarn bombing is not new to Crochet Texas! In 2014, we were asked to yarn bomb the set of "Good Morning Texas." Later that year we yarn bombed the lower lobby at Scottish Rite Hospital in Dallas. We used mainly baby blankets that they could later sell at their bazaars. We crocheted dozens and dozens of blankets, and had donations of blankets from as far away as Colorado and Hawaii. In 2019, the Dallas Farmers Market asked us to yarn bomb an antique tractor for their Spring Festival. We also help yarn bomb DFW Fiber Fest. See below:

Sometimes inspiration fills a need in a creative way. Mindy likes to hang crochet decorations on the front door of her condo. She needed one for the winter once the holidays were over. So she looked for a pattern that was small enough and looked like winter.





The Frida's Flowers afghan, inspired by the artist Frida Kahlo, was a class held over the course of several meetings in 2024. Lynne, despite being a beginning crocheter, was drawn in by the color combinations. She learned a lot in the process, and the results kept her going. Now she is looking for a place to display her beautiful afghan!

Molly had purchased several mirrored wall decorations to hang near her staircase, but one came with a broken mirror. She was able to replace it, but the broken motif inspired her to create something new. The solution was, of course, crochet. She spray painted the piece white, wrapped the top and bottom with yarn, and crocheted flowers for the center sections. Now she has the perfect piece of mixed media crochet art for her office wall.



Anna fell in love with free form crochet quite a while ago, and she still loves it. While cleaning out her condo in New York, she came across this free form piece she started years ago. The crochet art still resides in New York, maybe it's just not ready to leave The Big Apple.

Before COVID, DFW Fiber Fest asked Crochet Texas! to make mandalas to hang in the convention center. Jan had a lot of purple and purple-complementary yarn, and she crocheted a garden of puffy flowers to go on her mandala. Since the conference was canceled due to COVID, her artwork now hangs in her bedroom.

the wet clay. For Christine, her piece was about form, memory, and meaning. The selected design departed from the traditional circle doily. Instead, it had lacet edging sections that squared off the final shape. More than a craft experiment, this event showcased crochet as a form of expressive art. The fusion of fiber and clay allowed each creator to explore the tactile possibilities of stitch work beyond fabric.

The Heart of Crochet



Sometimes your heart is so overflowing with an emotion, such as gratitude, that the only way you can express it is to crochet. This sounds grandiose, but it is the experience

of Pam, who had a heart transplant. Her feelings towards the family who gave her life while mourning the loss of a loved one was almost impossible to put into words. So she created an incredible work of art and love for her donor's family. The judges of the State Fair of Texas recognized the art of her free form heart afghan. Not only did it receive a Blue Ribbon and Best of Show, it also received the Director's award.

How to crochet LOVE

Supply List

Crochet Hook - 20 mm and 9mm

Yarn - A collection of medium and bulky weight yarn.

Measuring Tape

Terms

Chain - ch Single Crochet - sc

Tree Wrap

- 1. With 20 mm hook and one strand of each of medium weight and bulky weight yarn or 3 medium weight yarn strands in hand, make a slip knot and ch until the length reaches 36 inches or the length of your tree.
- 2. Make 1 sc in the 2nd ch from the hook and 1 sc in each remaining ch.



*Double stranding yarn is a technique for combining and crocheting with two (or 3) different strands of yarn at the same time. Double stranding yarn adds dimensions to your crochet piece.



- 3. Turn, make 1 sc in each remaining sc across.
- 4. Repeat step 3 until the width of your rectangle reaches 24 inches, or the circumference of your tree.
- 5. Finish off.

Letters - 9 mm hook

- 1. Make a slip knot and ch 10.
- 2. Make 1 sc in the 2nd ch from the hook, then make 1 sc in each of the next 9 ch.
- 3. Turn, make 1 sc in each of the next 9 sc.
- 4. Finish off.
- 5. Make a slip knot and ch 7.
- 6. Make 1 sc in the 2nd ch from the hook, then make 1 sc in each of the next 6 ch.
- 7. Turn, make 1 sc in each of the next 6 sc.
- 8. Finish off.
- 9. Glue or sew together.



O

- 1. Make a slip knot and ch 24.
- 2. Join ends with 1 sc to work in the round. Make 1 sc in each ch around, increasing in the 4th, 10th, 16th, and 23rd ch-- 27 stitches.
- 3. Continue to make 1 sc in each sc around, increasing in the 6th, 12th, 18th, and 24th sc-- 31 stitches.
- 4. Finish off.

V

- 1. Make a slip knot and ch 11.
- 2. Make 1 sc in the 2nd ch from the hook, then make 1 sc in each of the next 10 ch.
- 3. Turn, make 1 sc in each of the next 10 sc.
- 4. Finish off.
- 5. Repeat steps 1-3 to make a second piece.
- 6. Glue or sew together.

E

- 1. Make a slip knot and ch 10.
- 2. Make 1 sc in the 2nd ch from the hook, then make 1 sc in each of the next 9 ch.
- 3. Turn, make 1 sc in each of the next 9 sc.
- 4. Finish off.
- 5. Make a slip knot and ch 5.
- 6. Make 1 sc in the 2nd ch from the hook, then make 1 sc in each of the next 4 ch.
- 7. Turn, make 1 sc in each of the next 4 sc.
- 8. Finish off.
- 9. Repeat steps 4-7 to make three short pieces total.
- 10. Glue or sew together.

*Add a border to each letter by working one sc stitch around the perimeter. Use a different color yarn to make the letters pop!





How to yarn bomb it!

Start at the top of the tree wrap and weave pieces of yarn back and forth, creating an X pattern down one side of the tree. Crisscross the strings over and under each other, working your way in and out of the crochet loops the same way you would lace a shoe. When you reach the bottom secure with a double knot. Sometimes I secure the top and the bottom of the crochet by wrapping extra yarn around the tree.
