## Why Crochet?

During the Crochet Texas meet-up at the 2025 DFW Fiber Fest, a knitter kept on asking Jan, “Why not knitting?” Jan mentioned many reasons to crochet. But the knitter kept on asking, “Why not knitting?” Finally, Jan said that Crochet Texas is a chapter of the Crochet Guild of America, and part of its mission is education devoted to crochet.

To explore the question further, why not knitting? Well, you can often create the same effects in crochet and knitting. Honorary Crochet Texan Margaret Hubert published a book called *Knit or Crochet—Have It Your Way*. She shows the same projects as knitted and crocheted. However, in her introduction, Margaret notes that converting a knit pattern directly to a crochet pattern is not easy. “*With the help of a calculator, knowledge of lots of different stitches and how they behave, the ability to convert gauge and figure out how many crochet stitches it would take to get the same size swatch, and understanding the slope of decreasing or increasing, you could probably do it.*” There are other books as well, such as the stitch dictionary *From Needles to Hook — Complete Guide to Converting Knit Patterns to Crochet*, by The Needlecraft Shop. However, I did not find any books on converting crochet to knit.



You can also knit with a crochet hook. Many years ago, a CGOA conference introduced this technique in one of their classes. It was later popularized as knooking. The scarf shown at left is a simple knit and purl stitch repeat, created on a crochet hook. You can knook with special hooks that have holes on the end to run a cable and move your work around back to the hook. Or you can knook with an interchangeable crochet cable hook, with a knitting needle tip the same size or a smaller size. There are many books and patterns available for knooking. Yet you can't crochet with a knitting needle.



There is nothing wrong with knitting—it's an incredible art form—but it's not normally a part of Crochet Texas! If you want to see what stretching your crochet muscles can create, see our classes from 2025!

### Free Game for Freeform

# ROLL WITH THE STITCHES

## freeform crochet dice game

Roll the dice to determine the fate of your freeform crochet project. Keep rolling to figure out your next move! Stop when your swatch is a square, or keep going to create a unique cowl or scarf!

**Lets Go!** Grab a Furls Streamline Metal crochet hook, several colors of stash yarn, and a 6-sided die. Start with your favorite color of yarn and chain 24 to begin, then turn and ch 1 then sc across to establish your foundation. At the end of each row, turn then roll to find out your crochet fate.

Notes: Instructions written in US terms. Each row should always equal 24 st. Starting ch stitches on each row count as 1 st. Unless specified, you may change yarn to color of your choice if desired at the start of each row. When finished, bind off, then weave in all ends.

|  | Basic Row! Change yarn to darkest color you have and ch3 for first st, then dc in each st across.  |
|  | Marled Row! Hold 2 strands together and ch2 for first st, then hdc across. Decide if you want to keep or lose the 2 <sup>nd</sup> strand for the next row.   |
|  | Shell Stitches! <b>Row 1:</b> ch 1 then sc in same st, *sk 2 st then work 5 dc in next st, sk 2 st then work sc into next st. Rep from * 3x. Turn. <b>Row 2:</b> Ch 3, dc 2 in same stitch, sk 2, sc in next st, *sk 2, dc 5 in next st, sk 2, sc in next, rpt from * x 2, sk 2, 3dc in last sc from previous row. |
|  | Stripes! Close your eyes and choose 2 stash yarns. Crochet a row in the first color using the st of your choice across. Then crochet a row in the next color using the same st across. Roll to find out how many times to repeat these rows. Ex. If you roll a 4, repeat 4x.                                       |
|  | Puff/Bobble Row! Go back to your 1 <sup>st</sup> color, then ch3 for first st, sk st, [puff or bobble st, ch1 and sk next st] 11x until last st, which should be a dc. Optional: Turn, ch 1 and sc across.   |
|  | Tapestry crochet! Crochet over unused colors as you carry them to hide the floats. Add a 2 <sup>nd</sup> yarn color (if you don't have one) and with C1 ch3 in first st, then dc in next 3 st. *With C2 dc in next 4st, change to C1 and dc in next 4st. Repeat to end of row.                                     |
